A house system has been launched at St Michael's and is already proving a huge success. Trip to the Festival Hall- London Jazz Festival- Keturah Evans- Year 10

Year 10 and 11 pupils that study GCSE Music were taken to “The Jazz Voice” concert, broadcast live by the BBC, which was an amazing experience!

We went to the grand opening of the London Jazz Festival on the 10th November and it was impressive to see a big band as well as an orchestra playing a part in Jazz music where it made the overall effect sound so much more sophisticated.

The concert was a great way to see different aspects of Jazz, Motown and soul music and the performers/singers were absolutely amazing. They had such enthusiasm, which made us all feel the same way.

The introduction of the whole concert started with music that sounded like it would have been used in thriller movies and horror films! It began with a very dark approach but swiftly changed from tense and dramatic music to swing jazz.

The change to jazz was introduced by an incredible drummer, who used the whole range of his drum kit to wow the audience. The first performer was Vanessa Haynes who sang “I’m Going To Live Until I Die”.

One of the artists had taken a different approach compared to the others, Miles Mosley. This performance was especially interesting because he played the double bass, whilst singing and used an “effects pedal” to create distorted sounds from the cello, which actually ended up blending well with the song he performed, “Ain’t No Sunshine”- originally sung by Bill Withers. He used the instrument and the effects pedal to create different sounds, specifically during the instrumental of the song.

Overall, the concert was delightful and the terrific arrangements by Guy Barker, who also conducted the concert, made full use of the orchestra and big band on stage made up of some of the greatest musicians in the world. Listen to the concert here:


Whitstable Retreat

Robes Sleep Out 2017

Robes Charity takes an active approach to removing the homeless from the cold streets of London and other parts of the UK, giving them future prospects.

I have recently taken part in an event organised by Robes to raise money to provide a residence for those who are homeless. Over 250 Londoners raised were sponsored by friends and family to spend a full night sleeping outside on one of the coldest nights of the year. The event allowed individuals to immerse themselves into a typical night spent out by a homeless person, and raise awareness for a largely ignored problem - especially in large cities.

I managed to raise £150 in two weeks from, mostly supported by few members of staff from St. Michael's. This appeared to be insignificant in comparison to the auction and entertainment which raised just under £10k in one night.

National theatre Costume hire



On the 29th of November 2017, the year 12 and 13 textiles classes went to visit the national theatre costume hire. This was to help us with our primary research in our course work that we are starting next year, or have already started, as some of us are planning to design and make a costume, but some of us are planning to make normal clothing for example a reversible suit.

The national costume hire is open to theatres, colleges, people who wish to hire for fancy dress etc. Their costumes and props have been used by various organisations, such as: The Royal Shakespeare Company, Punchdrunk Theatrical Experiences Ltd. Curve Theatre, Barbican, Headlong Theatre, Philharmonic Orchestra, Opera Theatre Europe and many more. They get these costumes from over twenty productions coming from the National Theatre each year. All costumes are created in their workshops by their highly skilled staff whose attention to detail and historical knowledge ensures that everything is produced to the highest quality.

Whilst we were there, we took pictures of the costumes and any type of design that appealed to our ideas for design in our coursework. This was so when we got back to school, we could talk about the type of material and how it has influenced us in our costumes etc.

Overall, it was really interesting to see how clothes and the design of them have changed over the years, due to social changes. It was nice to experience learning outside of the classroom, as it included the work we are doing in class as well as things we are going to be doing. It was enjoyable to be able to do independent work there (by finding the costumes we would want to use in our coursework) as well as working in a group to see everyone else's ideas. - **Miss Arjan**
