Mission week 2013

During the first week of term after the Easter holidays, St Michael's was lucky enough to have a mission team visit the college.

The Zion Mission is a religious group whose aim is to bring young people closer to God through a series of religious activities and Prayer. On the first day of mission week, there was an introductory assembly. The assembly started off with the Zion Mission team members introducing themselves and saying what they liked. After that, Rahel (one of the team members) talked about the importance of God in her life. One of the things she said definitely stood out to me; God will always be there for us, and if we sin, we have the opportunity to be forgiven. Following the relaxed and spiritual atmosphere, the Zion Mission team performed a sign-language prayer to calm music, which shows that actions speak louder than words. We then went into prayer. The Zion Mission team prayed that we receive the grace of God into our lives and spread the word of God, during a moment of reflection.

Each day of the week an assembly was held after morning registration, and every year group was able to participate. In addition to the assemblies, the Zion Mission team offered a series of activities throughout the week. These included 'Light-Fever' (an opportunity to experience the presence of Jesus while lighting a candle in the chapel),



learning a sign-language prayer, Precious (a girl's only workshop where the topic of beauty was discussed) and Prayer4U. I chose to attend the sign-language workshop, because I knew that I would get something out of it. Something interesting I learnt was that we can pray in many different ways. We can pray by thinking spiritually, meditating and praying in sign language. Also, on Thursday, the Youth-Alpha launch party took place after school. At the event, the Zion Mission Team talked about the importance of Christianity and how Jesus said "I am the way and the truth and the life", which shows that he was truly the son of God.

On Thursday, the Zion Mission team held a church service named the 'Main Event', at The Most Holy Trinity Church, Dockhead.

The mass consisted of The Gospel, readings and a sign language performance. Pupils who attended received a book about catechism. On the final Friday, the whole college was able to attend Mass in the college hall, in separate year groups. Several Priests were present, and the mass had a peaceful and relaxed atmosphere. 
The final race was the relay, whereby each of the year group teams race a given distance, changing rowers at a given distance. Following some
