French Film history Tour at the BFI

As a French enthusiast and film lover, the opportunity to attend the BFI on the 25th January definitely came as a chance to be taken! Both Year 12 & 13, accompanied by two members of staff, travelled by tube to Waterloo to enjoy our day out. The first half of the day consisted of an introduction to the history of French film and the development from the old "cinema de papa" films to "La Nouvelle Vague" (The New Wave). These were creative and modern films with low budgets made by directors who sought to tell a story with their films rather than reenact a love story or a moment of history. Elements from this "New Wave" of film include no explicit beginning, middle or end. Rather, the viewer is

placed directly into the scene, giving the director control of the message they want to convey. The second half of the day saw us watch a modern French film ourselves called 'Entre les Murs' (The Class) which personally left me astonished as I thought there was no clear end or resolution. Overall, the experience allowed me to engage with my studies on a deeper level and understand the contextual factors of our A-Level course which will hopefully boost my grade next year. Bless N. St Valentine's day

Saint Valentine, officially known as Saint Valentine of Rome, is a third-century Roman Saint widely celebrated on February 14th and commonly associated with "courtly love."

Although not much of Saint. Valentine's life is reliably known, and whether or not the stories involve two different Saints by the same name is also not officially decided, it is highly agreed that Saint. Valentine was martyred and then buried on the Via Flaminia to the north of Rome.

In 1969, the Roman Catholic Church removed Saint. Valentine from the General Roman Calendar, because so little is known about him. However, the church still recognizes him as a Saint, listing him in the February 14th spot of Roman Martyrology.
