The time I spent at Morgan Stanley involved getting to know a whole new set of people (successfully in just the space of two days!), listening to people who worked in interesting working fields such as banking & finance, IT, media and architecture hearing about their journey towards their career path and the skills needed along the way. It was so fascinating being right in the heart of the world of work: we visited out to Bloomberg and got the opportunity to see how things operate there. We were given an insight on the many ways firms such as Bloomberg and Morgan Stanley strive to improve the day-to-day working environment and conditions for their workers and how much the impact can be.




History Castle Project

On Saturday 6th April, 50 pupils and parents from St Michael's College watched Millwall defeat West Bromwich Albion 2- 0 at the New Den.




Chaplain's Corner: What is Pentecost?

Pentecost is considered to be the birthday of the Church. Pentecost is the festival when Christians celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated on the Sunday 50 days after Easter (the name comes from the Greek *pentekoste*, "fiftieth"). It is also called Whitsun, but does not necessarily coincide with the Whitsun Bank Holiday in the UK. Pentecost is regarded as the birthday of the Christian church, and the start of the church's mission to the world.

The Holy Spirit

The Holy Spirit is the third part of the Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit that is the way Christians understand God.

Celebrating Pentecost

Pentecost is a happy festival. Ministers in church often wear robes with red in the design as a symbol of the flames in which the Holy Spirit came to earth.

Pentecost Symbols

The symbols of Pentecost are those of the Holy Spirit and include flames, wind, the breath of God and a dove.

The first Pentecost

Pentecost comes from a Jewish harvest festival called Shavuot.

The apostles were celebrating this festival when the Holy Spirit descended on them.

It sounded like a very strong wind, and it looked like tongues of fire.

The apostles then found themselves speaking in foreign languages, inspired by the Holy Spirit.

People passing by at first thought that they must be drunk, but the apostle Peter told the crowd that the apostles were full of the Holy Spirit.
