Throughout 2020 we will be exploring scripture as a community. We are particularly focused on taking messages we learn relating them to society and how we can put this into action to help others.















Why do we need the Year of the Word?









45% feel we don't have enough time to read the Bible.






34% say the Bible is extremely important to the Catholic faith.





St. Jerome






St. Matthew's Gospel

On the last day of term, we all joined together to celebrate in our Carol Service. We used scripture and poetry to reflect on Jesus being the Light that Leads.







In preparation for the OAP Christmas Party 8S hosted a bake sale and raised £102.35 to help those in our local community.







We welcomed our wider community to celebrate with us. The pensioner's from Southwark joined us for Christmas dinner and to spend time with our wonderful Sixth Form students.







The Faith in Action group had their first guided reflection with Mr. Kelly. They explored the importance of Love, Service and the Kingdom of God. They lit candles to show that through their actions they can let their light shine into the world.







Our House Competitions allowed us to reflect on the meaning of Christmas as we all decorated our form room doors to show our beliefs.

For example, the forms in Rua each represented a different part of the Nativity story in St. Matthew's Gospel.







In R.E. lessons students regularly study scripture and explore how it influences the lives of Christians today. Miss Casey asked the students in Year 9 to become the expert. They successfully analysed scripture and hosted a seminar about it.
