Artificial intelligence at the Barbican – Year 12 Psychology trip



The whole of the Year 12 Psychology cohort (16 students) were present and correct at the Barbican for the exhibition "AI: More than human?" The purpose of the exhibition was to explore artificial intelligence inventions through time and take a closer look at the desire of human beings to create such increasingly realistic replicas of themselves. It attempted to answer the questions – *Why do we make robots? In what ways can they outperform humans? What are the implications of artificial creations? Where is artificial intelligence heading?* While these questions are of course not actually answered by the exhibition, the students thoroughly enjoyed pondering them and browsing the historical examples of man-made human

replacements, ranging from early 'golems', to Frankenstein's monster, to modern day computer technology. With an abundance of interactive activities (even including a 'live wall' where you could make art using robotic technology) showcasing the almost limitless potential of artificial intelligence, the students were fully engrossed throughout the exhibition. Filming continues and concludes over the summer and we look forward to screening the first trailer of the film at the school in the Autumn term. More details to follow in September. - Mr S. Pillai



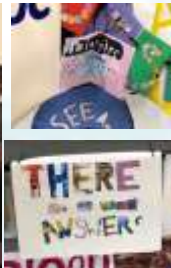
Year 7 visit Tate Modern

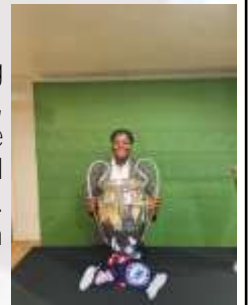
End of the Year Concert
