Black History Month

For Black History Month this October, Mr. Burton and the History department led a week of assemblies centered around the themes of identity and Black British history in London and beyond.

The students were made to reflect on Black British identity in the past and the present, considering how far things have changed, and what still needs to be done. The assembly provoked questions of what we can do as a school community to celebrate our differences and embrace all parts of our history and identities

The same themes will be continued into next half term's CPSHE topic, which will explore in more detail what it means to be both Black and British. The History Society will also be producing projects based on the same themes. The society's focus this term is on Black British history in our capital city. Using TFL's Black history tube map (pictured below) as a starting point, students from across different year groups will be producing online and physical projects about Black history in London.

'Heaven is not closed' with photographer Aisha Seriki



On 20th October, Art and Media Studies students attended a 'Challenge' seminar with Aisha Serike titled "Heaven is not closed." We were able to learn about the History of photography with the camera obscura method as well learn about some Black photographers like Omar Diop and about how she first got into photography through her father and through her GCSE art which inspired her. We first looked at some of her work that she took - she uses black models who often look strong yet vulnerable as in the media, black women are rarely portrayed in that light and are usually over masculinised or sexualised by the media. She then proceeded to show us photographs taken by white explorers during the colonisation of Africa. She talked to us about the 'Scramble for Africa' in the year 1884 and how Africans were dehumanised by the Europeans. We saw the difference in the photographs taken by the explorers, without the Africans' consent, and then the photographs taken by Africans of

other Africans with consent. We were able to see the change in expression and life in the photos. One African photographer, Malick Sidibé, said he wanted to give them "positions that brought something alive in them" which was the complete opposite of the Africans' position in the photos taken by the explorers. It was an interesting experience for many pupils which allowed us to get an insight into black representation in photography as well as its History. *Victoria D.*
