World Religions Focus

In order to reflect the wider life of the college community and to respect the area around us, the chaplaincy teams, Miss Casey and the whole **RE** department have spent time in lessons and putting on events to learn about different world religious festivals as they have come up in the calendar this past term.

We started in September with Sukkot, a celebration of Diwali at the beginning of November and finally a focus on Hanukkah as we came into December. Read below what we did over the past term, with written contributions by Juliana as part of the Year 12 Chaplaincy team.



<u>Sukkot</u>

Sukkot is a Jewish festival celebrated in autumn and it is also known as The Feast of Tabernacles. Sukkot commemorates the years that the Jews spent in the desert on their way to the Promised Land, and celebrates the way in which God protected them

under difficult desert conditions. It is celebrated by building a sukkah which is essentially a small shelter that must have 3 walls. Jews are required to eat





in the sukkah for eight days (seven days in Israel),

and some even sleep in the sukkah for the duration of the holiday. The sukkah is decorated and the first day is considered a holy day in which most forms of work are forbidden. At St Michael's we built ourselves a sukkah in our main hall with decorations all around it, especially paper leaves that the younger years decorated. Furthermore, everyone who visited the sukkah was given a treat of an apple dipped in honey. In lessons, Ks3 pupils learned about the history of the festival and

designed their own sukkah.

<u>Diwali</u>



In India, Diwali is known as India's most

important holiday. It is a Hindu festival and is the five-day Festival of Lights, celebrated by millions of Hindus, Sikhs and Jains across the world. Diwali, which for some also coincides with harvest and new year celebrations, is a festival of new beginnings and the triumph of

good over evil and light over darkness. In one of the main stories in Hindu mythology, Diwali is the day Lord Rama, his wife Sita Devi and brother Lakshmana return their homeland after 14 years in exile. The villagers lit a path for Rama. During Diwali, people wear their finest clothes, illuminate the interior and exterior of their homes with lights, perform worship ceremonies of Lakshmi (the goddess of prosperity and wealth), light fireworks, and partake in family feasts, where mithai (sweets) and gifts are shared.



In school we had a huge celebration in the hall after school

on the 4th November, which anyone could attend. Miss Casey led with a presentation before music played and members of the Year 12 chaplaincy team dished up a selection of foods. Finally everyone was given sweets to celebrate the blessings of the day.

In Ks3 lessons pupils learned about the full history of the festival, designed Diwali cards and coloured in elephants.



<u>Hanukhah</u>



This year Hanukkah stared on the 28th November, and across Ks3 lessons, the RE department delivered a full lesson to help pupils understand that whilst we began Advent on this same day, there are other celebrations taking place by others worldwide for a different religion.

Across these lessons delivered by the RE

department, pupils learned the history of the festival and reflected on the

miracle of the oil which lasted for 8 days, showing the Maccabees that God was



explored how it is celebrated in modern traditions and how, like at Christmas, many Jews opt to give gifts across the 8 nights of Hanukkah. The lessons culminated with pupils decorating their own Menorah's and finally they were gifted a donut, as fried food is a main focus of



foods shared in Hanukkah to reflect the oil in the Temple.

During the last year or so, it has been quite difficult getting back to a somewhat normality. However, the time I spent in lockdown helped me appreciate and think about what small deeds I could do that might help people e.g donating clothes to charity or doing a prayer for those I believe are in need. With hope, we can encourage others to do the same and have faith in their actions even with the smallest things like praying to God.



looked very similar to the traditional ones. I really enjoyed this project as it allowed me to envision the future products we would do in the Chaplaincy team.
