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Metro Bank: Day to Amaze

On Thursday, 25th November, a group of Year 10 pupils visited Metro Bank's Headquarters in Bloomsbury to attend their 'Day to Amaze' programme. The students learned that banking is not just about maths skills. Several members of the bank's 'People Team' (HR) explained how Metro has sought to carve out a unique reputation and culture in British banking by prioritising customer service and interactions. They gave lots of examples of this such as their longer business hours, ensuring helpline callers get to speak to a real person within minutes, and welcoming dogs into their banks. They explained how these 'culture goals' influence the qualities they are looking for in potential employees. Their job interviews almost always involve doing role plays, so skills from subjects like Drama and English are important too! The host for the day said he had been a professional comedian before coming to work there.





The pupils took part in a number of team-building and learning activities that explored what is involved in good customer service. They also had the chance to learn about personal budgeting and CV writing. The day concluded with a member of the bank's senior executive team sharing her story of struggling in school but ultimately overcoming dyslexia to become an advertising expert and company leader. She challenged the students to not let anything get in the way of their ambitions. She said that whilst grades are important, good companies also want to hire people with the right spirit and character. *Mr Walker*

The Word of the Lord

John 18:33-37 (Feast of Christ the King)

33 So Pilate went back into the Praetorium and called Jesus to him and asked him, 'Are you the king of the Jews?'

34 Jesus replied, 'Do you ask this of your own accord, or have others said it to you about me?'

35 Pilate answered, 'Am I a Jew? It is your own people and the chief priests who have handed you over to me: what have you done?'

36 Jesus replied, 'Mine is not a kingdom of this world; if my kingdom were of this world, my men would have fought to prevent my being surrendered to the Jews. As it is, my kingdom does not belong here.'

37 Pilate said, 'So, then you are a king?' Jesus answered, 'It is you who say that I am a king. I was born for this, I came into the world for this, to bear witness to the truth; and all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice.'

A reflection on this...

In these times of fake news and alternatives facts, it is so refreshing to hear Jesus solemnly proclaim that he was born and came into the world to testify to the truth.

The basic truth is that God is love and loves the world he created so much that he sent his own Son to save it. It is key to ask yourself - 'what is an important truth for me, and to what extent am I committed to find it and live by it?'

'My kingdom is not from this world'.

From the rest of Jesus' words and especially from his actions it is obvious that he does not mean that his kingdom is totally other-worldly, having nothing to do with matters of this world. He means that it is not built on power-seeking at all costs and on violence, like most 'kingdoms' of this world, but on other values, mostly on love, mercy and universal solidarity.
