# Science Week: Zoolab Visit



In the week beginning on the 14th March St Michael's took part in the Science Week by hosting Lottie from the Zoolab.

She brought in a sample of her 600 exotic animal collection featuring a tarantula, a giant snail, a constrictor snake, a big scorpion and a small gecko. All these animals were rescued from unhealthy circumstances and found a new loving home under the care of Lottie and her team.

Lottie was able to give students and staff a real insight into the lives of these incredible creatures in the wild as well as the responsibility and commitment it takes to be a pet owner to one of these wonderful creatures.

All students and staff members that had the chance to see the animals and touch them were fascinated with the experience.

Many of the students were amazed at how smooth and soft Daffodil the snake felt with many students wanting to get a pet snake. Lottie informed students of the space and feeding habits snakes have, such as needing a 5ft by 6ft enclosure costing around  $\pounds$ 800 and having to keep dead mice in the freezer! This allowed students to really learn about the importance of information before choosing a pet.

Students also learnt about the geckos from New Caledonia, who are able to drop their tail as a distraction in order to get away from predators. This particularspecies of gecko cannot regrow its tail, therefore students had to be very quiet in order not to scare him.

Students were amazed with him and he never lost his tail and Lottie loved visiting St Michael's college, highlighting how wonderful all the students were with very thought provoking questions.





Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.


