Between 1969 and 1972, six manned Apollo missions successfully landed on the Moon, allowing the Astronauts to collect samples and bring them back to Earth for study. 382 kilograms of lunar material were returned to Earth and the college was lucky to receive a box of samples from NASA and the Science and Technology Facilities Council. Staff and students were able to view the lunar samples and hold a variety of meteorites, including one from Mars. A house competition also ran during this time and some fantastic entries were submitted in the model, poster and photograph categories. Congratulations to all the winners!



Book review: All The Light We Cannot See by Anthony Doerr



This novel follows the story of Marie-Laure and Werner, who both live during World War II. Werner has a talent for maths and science and engineering, while Marie-Laure is an avid braille reader and excellent at solving her father's puzzles for her birthday. When Paris is bombed, Marie and her father flee to the coast, while Werner attends an elite school for talented German boys. Over the years their stories intertwine so beautifully and I love the way Doerr writes about this.

The simplicity of the novel and their stories makes it complex to fully understand in my opinion, especially with the short perspective changes; it makes you want to keep reading and finding out more and more.

I highly recommend this novel and I think it's so beautifully written and quite deep that I recommend reading it with someone. I read it with my best friend and we both realised small things throughout and later crop up as the story progresses, yet again making it a wonderful read. If you're a fan of historical fiction that immerses you fully in the story, I certainly recommend this book.

Pupils from Gardening Club, the STEM Club and the Eco-Committee attended, and through a craft project, understood the role of bees as pollinators.


