Social Media and Newsletter - Stephen Bourne visits St Michael's

It's been a privilege to have Stephen Bourne visit the College to speak to our Year 8 history students about the 'hidden history' of Black British involvement in the First World War. Thanks to Ms McMahon for organising.



8M and 8B had a fantastic lesson with Stephen Bourne, writer, film and social historian specialising in black heritage and gay culture. His best-known book is *Black Poppies - Britain's Black Community and the Great War* which he has republished for a young adult audience.

8M and 8B have spent the past 2 weeks studying the British Caribbean contributions to the First World War. More than 15,000 British Caribbean troops volunteered to fight for the British Armed Forces from 1914-1918. One of these soldiers was Norman Manley, who later became the First Prime Minister of independent Jamaica in 1962. Despite these soldiers' contributions to the First World War, their efforts have largely been forgotten.

Jae (8B) commented on how special it was to meet a historian, and his classmates in 8B and 8M said that meeting Stephen had changed how they understood British history. Ryan (8B) said: "West Indian people and other

races were crucial to Britain winning the First World War," and Lexi (8B) said she loved hearing "overlooked stories" and that "Stephen telling us about individuals gives us a better understanding of history in WWI." Kingsley (8M) said he would be taking out Stephen's book from his local library.

We hope that Stephen Bourne can join us in November to celebrate these forgotten soldiers for Remembrance Day. Until then, check out <u>his books</u>!

<u>Belgium</u>



During the February half term, we had the incredible opportunity of going to Belgium with the Inner Voices choir. Our trip lasted five days and in those few days not only did we get to sing in many beautiful towns, including Bruges, Ypres and the gorgeous Ghent, but we also made so many new friends. We spent our time going on boat rides through the Lys River (where we learnt about the history of the beautiful city), having bowling torments in Kortrijk and exploring the Gravensteen, Castle of the Counts.

When we were not singing in incredible Cathedrals we were exploring the city in groups and eating our fair

share of Belgian waffles. It was seriously the most fantastic experience for all of us. In our time in Inner Voices, we have performed in St Paul's Cathedral twice, travelled to Durham for a couple of days and visited Belgium!

Thanks to the opportunity to join the choir we were able to form an incredible community and bond with all of the choir members and learn so much (especially musically). We will never forget the times when we got to sing in front of over 300 people from all over Belgium in one day, perform at the Last Post Ceremony (which is a ceremony that takes place every night at the Menin Gate in Ypres in tribute to all the Belgian soldiers who died in WW1), and the hilarious times we had at the bowling alley with our choir instructors. The Belgium trip taught us how dedication and hard work were the reasons we were able to sing in the fabulous Sint-Niklaas (Saint Nicholas) 13th century cathedral and fundamentally have the opportunity to travel to Belgium.

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St Paul's Knightsbridge

Although it is a smaller church than St Paul's Cathedral, it is still a wonderful place to sing. The work we had put in as a choir paid off beautifully, the soloists and their singing during the Disney love melodies were exceptional, making me believe that the original singers were in our group.
