THE 200TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DREAM OF ST. JOHN BOSCO





On Wednesday 31st January, as a college we celebrated the 200th Anniversary of the Dream of Bosco. Fr. Keith came in on that day to lead us in Mass to celebrate this momentous day for Salesian's Worldwide. We were reminded of the message of the heart of each child is at the focus of what we do each and everyday. We reflected that through our RUAH Values we live out the dream that he had for, at the time, the children of Turin, but that this extends to all children now living in the Salesian ethos. Year 8 Bosco helped to lead this special Mass and all students across the college shared in a focal presentation for the day. As part of the celebrations, Bosco held their charity week and students and staff were asked to send messages of when they have seen someone 'showing their RUAH'.



YEAR 9 RETREAT



The Year 9 retreat took place across two Fridays before February Half Term. Around this time the celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the Dream of St John Bosco was always held, this was the theme that the students reflected upon. Students were shown a video of people. somewhat older than themselves, being asked 'What do you want to be when you grow up?' all of the people laughed. It was a clear message that to stop dreaming, is to stop hoping. We were reminded of the Dream of Bosco for all young people and that we were in fact living out his dream, so certainly many things can be possible through hope, faith and determination. Students shared their wishes and dreams for their own futures; reflecting on how the values of RUAH might encourage them and aid them in their own future lives. Each group wrote song a about hope, dreams and faith set to a pre-existing tune; they spoke of the need to keep God at the centre of all that they do.













LENTEN LITURGY AND RECONCILIATION





Before half term, members of the Chaplaincy in Year 12 attended their second CAFOD Young Leadership Training Day. They were keen to share their newfound knowledge and drive for fundraising with the rest of the college. Prior to the start of Lent, students put together their own assembly speaking of the importance of Ash Wednesday and the true focus of Lent. Students shared the story of James, the Fisherman in Liberia, who without the help of CAFOD might have lost his life for his work. Year 12 Chaplains shared the message and hope of Lent, that people might spend some time giving back to those less fortunate than themselves, as well spending time in reflection of themselves.

Once Lent began, each Thursday morning Year 12 Chaplains shared a special service with all year groups to spread the message of Reconciliation and encourage students in the rest of the college to attend with a Priest. They shared the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant, and shared that worrying about riches does not help one to please God, it is grace, loving thy neighbour and reconciliation in the eyes of the Lord.



RACIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY





Each year at the Cathedral, Archbishop John Wilson leads a special Sunday Mass focusing on the importance of Racial Justice and Equality in the world and especially within the diocese of Southwark. Miss Casey attended with pupils from the Sixth Form Chaplaincy to represent the college. All students were invited to attend and many were present at St George's, as well as Paul G (11DA) and Mateusz W (10MA) who were altar serving during the Mass.

Sunday 28th January marked Racial Justice Sunday in the Archdiocese of Southwark, which was commemorated with a Mass held in St George's Cathedral. As part of St Michael's wider work with the community, the Chaplaincy Team sent representatives to attend this Mass, at the invitation of Canon Victor Darlington, the head of the Commission for Promoting Racial Justice and Cultural Inclusion in the Archdiocese. It was truly inspiring to see such a commitment towards promoting diversity and inclusion within the mission of the Church, and in his homily, Archbishop John Wilson delivered a very significant message: there is no place for racism. There was also a focus on celebrating cultural heritage, with the bidding prayers read in the languages of different communities within Southwark, and a procession at the beginning, highlighting the plethora of cultures and communities who are all united through God's love. Year 13 created messages of hope to begin the last few months of their time at St Michael's; which were then pieced together, to showcase their statement of intent for their futures.



WORLD RELIGIONS: RAMADAN AND NOWRUZ


