

A Boy Named Jorge

Jorge Mario Bergoglio was born in Argentina in 1936. He loved playing football with his friends and helping his grandmother in the kitchen. As he grew older, he realised that he wanted to help people and eventually he decided to become a priest. He lived simply, took the bus to work, and always cared for the poor. In 2023 he became Pope Francis - the first to choose the name after St. Francis of Assisi known for his life of poverty, humility, and love for creation. Elected by conclave after the retirement of Pope Benedict XVI, he was the first Pope from Latin America. Pope Francis taught people to be kind, take care of the earth and love one another – just like Jesus!
